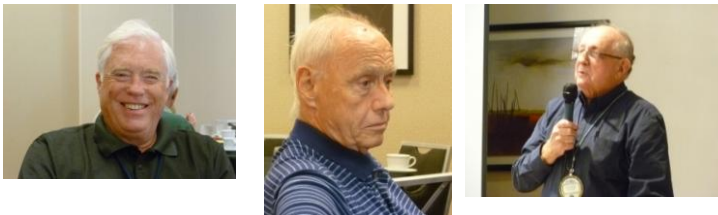

Erin Okins, a promoter at the Mayo Civic Center, was introduced by Bob McClocklin. We were then given a personal tour of the enlargement and enhancement of the Center. Very impressive! Lots of new meeting facility with up-to-date electronics. The official opening will be April 1.



Our speaker, and former member, Regina Seabrook, was introduced by Charlie Graham, along with her guests, Pastor Emily Ewing and Pastor Paul Moody of Mount Olive Lutheran Church. The subject was their Community Accompaniment Table and about the need for Christian congregations to deal with a changing world, particularly with many different races. Examples of recent problems were the killing of black members of the church in Charleston by a young white person, and also the killing of many GLBD young people in Orlando last year. Regina said 75% of Americans have no contact with other races, and in her church only 2% of members are people of color. The world is changing and congregations need to follow the example of Jesus in accepting everyone, as we are all created in the image of God. Pastor Moody spoke about the colonial world that was created in a white image of one right way, which is now changing. Pastor Ewing discussed how Germans became Lutheran while the English were Presbyterian, yet they came to a land that was...

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not theirs, like the Dakotas here in MN. These traditions must change, and young people today want justice, and they are seeking "meaning", and an opportunity to use their talent.

Bob Streytle (Age 82)

This past week former member Bob Steyle passed away here in Rochester. His funeral was held at Zumbro Lutheran Church on Saturday March 4. About 10 of our club members were able to attend. For details of Bob's life, see the obit in the Post Bulletin. We also are going to insert a bio of Bob from when he joined Kiwanis about 3 years ago.

Bob Streytle was born on a farm in Eastern South Dakota, towards the end of the great depression on September 11, 1934. My parents farmed there until 1939 when they felt the opportunities were better for farming in Northern Iowa.

Attended grade school and High School there graduating from High School in 1952. Finances were such that further schooling was not in the program at that time, so continued to farm with my father until 1954 at which time I entered the military service. After basic training was stationed for the remainder of my tour at Edwards Air Force Base in the Mojave Desert as a heavy equipment operator where we built roads and landing strips for the test pilots stationed at Edwards.

Was separated from active duty in 1956 and married Jean Baggs in September of 1957, which must have been one of the better things I have done since we just celebrated our 49th anniversary and looking

forward to our 50th next September. We hope to be celebrating that in Germany.

We had two sons-----John who is a Pshychologist in Lacrosse, Wi. He is married to Chris who is a Physician at Gunderson Clinic in LaCrosse. They have two daughters Johanna and Laura. Johanna is a Junior at Northwestern in Evanston, Ill. amd Laura is a Senior in High School at Central High School in LaCrosse.

Our other son David, is a Nurse Athesthetist at Mayo. He is married to Julie and they have three children, Maria a Freshman at John Marshall High School and twins Michael and Morgan who are in the 4th grade at Harriet Bishop Elementary.

I retired in the fall of 1996 after helping the local gas company get rid of their warehouse and large parts inventory and initiated a program for the service technicians to do their own ordering.

For the five years prior to that we owned and operated a gift and Amish furniture store which we liquidated . It was necessitated by many changes happening at that location.

Prior to that, for about 27 years I was in the retail field in various capacities. Part of the time with Montgomery Ward Company and the rest of the time on the road for a small oil company, Clark Oil. Since these were all company owned locations, I was responsible for the auditing and hiring of managers for these locations.

From the time of our marriage until then I did metal layout, fabrication and installation of many types of metal products. From furnace ductwork to metal framing and brackets for any sort of store fixtures. This was mostly in an experimental shop where we did all the testing for fixtures before they would go into production.
